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ABOUT THIS STUDY

This 60-day study is an overview of Acts and the letters. It is intended to be used as a guide so that you can build your own knowledge and learning of God's Word. God wants Scripture to dwell in us (Colossians 3:16), and for that to happen, we must know it for ourselves.

The study is organized in chronological order, making stops throughout Acts to read letters that would have most likely been written at that time. The study ends with more letters that were written after the events of Acts. **A timeline has been provided on page 26 for you to keep track of the events that took place.** As you look up information about when the events happened, keep in mind that resources can show different dates. Since it can be difficult for historians to date certain events and texts, it might be beneficial to note the different suggested dates on the timeline.

As you read each day, you will write a summary or the main idea of that reading. Writing the information that you have learned will help bring you greater understanding of the big picture of Acts and the letters. A space for each summary is arranged for you starting on page 27.

Paul's journeys to share the message of Christ are a major part of Acts. Throughout the study, you will be instructed to mark the cities to which he traveled. **Two maps have been provided for you on pages 34 and 35.**

This study could be used in different ways:

- Individually- Set aside a time each day to pray, read God's Word, and write what you have learned.
- Study with a friend- Set aside a time each day just as you would individually but also decide on a time to check in with a friend each week so that you can encourage one another as you study. Having a partner can help you keep on track.
- Homeschool curriculum- This could be used for 6th grade and up. It's a
 great way for children to see how the Bible connects. Reading one
 chapter a day, even through the letters, will extend this curriculum
 through the whole school year (150 days).

Helpful study tools:

- A study bible will be helpful for giving introductory information.
- A bible dictionary is useful for defining words in a biblical context.
- A bible Handbook is a good reference for additional historical information about each book of the Bible.
- A notebook may be helpful for any notes that you want to keep.

This chapter of Acts begins Paul's second journey. Using a red colored pencil, draw a line from Jerusalem to Antioch in Syria to Tarsus. It is believed that Tarsus is one of the cities that Paul visitied in Cilicia (Zondervan NIV Study Bible).

About when did this take place? Write Paul's second journey on the timeline.


